I wish to grow date palm in space, the astronaut tells Space University students

Those interested in video calling UAE astronaut Sultan Al Nevadi before he departs from the International Space Station (ISS) can head to Abu Dhabi today, as the second last edition of 'A Call from Space' with him will be held in the capital.

In another interactive session with students of the International Space University in Brazil on Tuesday, Al Neyadi expressed his wish to grow dates in space.

Responding to a question about what food he would prefer to grow in space, he said: "Honestly, this is something we already do here onboard the space station. We have facilities to grow plants. We have the facility to grow some vegetables. So it's an ongoing science and we have some astronauts who try the space-grown food. It is difficult, but personally, I would love to have maybe some palm trees with dates.'
